COVER STORY DR V.SHANTA | A HEALER. A PIONEER. A LEGEND

"TO LIVE IN HEARTS WE I FAVE BEHIND IS NOT TO DIF."

THOMAS CAMPBELL SCOTTISH POET

A Life of Compassion and Dedication

In a world where medicine is often profit-driven, Dr. V. Shanta stood apart. She embodied compassion, altruism, and unwavering dedication to health and healing for all. Truly, she lived by the adage: "work is worship."

Born on 11 March 1927 in Mylapore, Chennai, to Viswanathan and Balaparvati, Dr. Shanta hailed from a renowned and educated family. Remarkably, she belonged to a lineage that included two Nobel laureates: Sir C.V. Raman and Dr. Subramaniam Chandrashekhar. Her grandfather, an avid reader, was a pillar of encouragement throughout her life. Her education began at National Girls High School and continued at Madras Medical College, where she earned her MBBS, DGO, and MD degrees by 1955.



A Defining Moment

While working in the cancer ward at the Institute, Dr. Shanta witnessed the compassionate care Dr. Krishnamurthi gave to terminally ill patients. Deeply moved, she realized, "This is where I belong." This moment changed her life's trajectory. Instead of pursuing a prestigious post at the Government Maternity Hospital, she joined the Cancer Institute, then a modest 12-bed cottage hospital founded by her childhood idol, Dr. Muthulakshmi Reddy—a pioneer in Indian medicine. She dedicated her life to this institute, living on its premises until her last day.



Building a Legacy

The Cancer Institute has been fortunate or rather blessed to usually attract like-minded, service-oriented doctors. Dr. Krishnamurthi, followed his mother Dr. Muthulakshmi Reddy's footsteps and was joined ably by Dr. Shanta, in transforming the institute into a 675-bed world-class facility. Today, it treats over 100,000 patients annually, offering free or subsidized care.

Dr. Shanta insisted that every patient—rich or poor—receive equal treatment and respect. She led by example, conducting rounds, dressing wounds, and personally writing case records. For her, true healing went beyond medical skill; it required empathy and quiet strength from the doctor to help revive the patient's morale. Her guiding belief was: "Fear not cancer diagnosis, but its delay." Over six decades, she turned this conviction into hope and healing.

The Quiet Revolutionary

In a world where medicine is often reduced to statistics, scans and surgical precision, Dr. V. Shanta dared to bring back the one element that could never be measured: the human heart. At the core of her remarkable life and career stood a truth so simple, yet so revolutionary-care is not a procedure; it is a relationship. The physician must become part of the family.

In an era of overbooked appointments and rushed consultations, she spent time. She listened. She remembered that at the heart of the word "healthcare" is "care." "Care is caring for the individual, like what you would do for your mother or father or child... Even when there is no hope, you have to give some message of hope to sustain them." She believed that curing patients went far beyond medical expertise, it involved the confidence and empathy of a doctor.

She often said that technological advances must not be adopted just because they exist, but only if they truly serve patients in a meaningful, cost-effective way. At a time when much of healthcare is becoming commercialized, Dr. Shanta held firm to the Institute's founding values: that quality care should never depend on a patient's ability to pay. "Sixty percent of our patients receive free or subsidized treatment. And regardless of whether someone pays or not, the care is exactly the same. No one is ever turned away."

Dr. V. Shanta's life reminds us that leadership is not always loud, that revolutions can be quiet, and that sometimes, the most powerful legacy is built not on power, but on love, integrity, and relentless service. Her story is not just one of medicine, it is a story of humanity at its best. Her presence remains palpable in its corridors — in the free beds for the poor, the counselling rooms for the grieving, and in that story, she will live on.

The Memorial Museum


Dr. Shanta's room at the institute has been transformed into a memorial. The museum is housed in her lifelong home—the top floor of the Gandhinagar campus. Visitors immediately sense an aura of calm and positive energy.

The walls, roof and the floor of the memorial aren't adorned with luxurious lamps, stained glass-windows and embroidered carpets, but there is an inherent sense of simplicity which Dr Shanta stood for, all throughout her life.

The museum features memorabilia of vintage black-and-white photographs of her childhood, her meetings with oncology luminaries, and interactions with India's prime ministers and chief ministers who supported the hospital.

The photos of Dr Shanta playing the Tambura and she engrossed in a game of chess adds a personal touch. The west wall showcases her highest honours:

- Padma Shri (1986)
- Padma Bhushan (2006)
- Padma Vibhushan (2016)
- Ramon Magsaysay Award (2005) & many more.



A frail almirah preserves her personal belongings: pocket-sized diaries revealing her perfectionism and candid views, two pairs of beige footwear, fountain pens, plain white handkerchiefs, and an old-fashioned spectacle. These simple possessions tells the story of a woman clad in a crisp cotton saree, tirelessly toiling to change oncology care profoundly.



Honouring a Legend

On April 22, 2025, Honourable Chief Minister M.K. Stalin unveiled Dr. Shanta's statue and museum. He said, "Today, I unveiled Dr. Shanta's statue and museum at the very place where she devoted her entire life to serving needy patients. The museum, filled with her belongings and ideals, left me deeply moved and inspired."



A"Work of Heart"

Dr V. Shanta's gentle assurance, her fierce commitment to justice, and her refusal to compromise on ethics made the Cancer Institute what it is today, a beacon of hope. The memorial is a fitting gesture to ensure her contributions are remembered as part of India's history.

The memorial does more than commemorate—it resonates, inspires, and connects. It whispers the story of silent dedication and service, urging visitors to touch, feel, imbibe, and carry forward Dr. Shanta's selfless teachings.

This institution is truly a "work of heart."
